## President's Letter

*Missey intended to reflect on her first year as President in this month's letter. However, due to her mother's death, she is out of town, so that will have to wait. In the meantime, she asked us to share a few highlights and updates with you.*

### What's going on in the League right now?

**The Illinois Fair Map Amendment** petition drive has ended. Unfortunately, we did not collect enough signatures to get the amendment on the ballot in November. Nonetheless, we want to thank everyone who got out there to get petitions signed. The LWVIL will, not concede failure or defeat. We will remain tireless in our efforts to monitor the process of redistricting in Illinois, and we will continue to pursue a constitutional amendment process as well as other approaches in order to reform the current and unacceptable way redistricting is done in Illinois

The topic for our April meeting was "**State of College of DuPage.**" Dr. Robert L. Breuder, the new college president, informed us of changes at the college and challenges the college faces. No surprise, there is little funding from the State. Dr. Joseph Collins, Associate Vice President of Academic Planning and Assessment, and Mr. Thomas Glaser, Vice President of Administrative Affairs, also joined Dr. Breuder for a Q & A session. Many of the questions pertained to the Older Adult Institute. COD is still committed to the OAI and there will be facility improvements in the future. However, it takes time for those changes and structures to be in place. A video of the meeting was made by COD and will be available on their website soon.

We hope everyone saw our Letter to the Editor in support of CUSD 200's efforts to balance their budget. The State of Illinois currently provides 15% of our CUSD 200's budget and is significantly behind in payments for this school year. The State should resume funding public schools (also mandated by Article

10 of the State of Illinois Constitution) and guarantee adequate levels of financial support. The league supports HB 174, a comprehensive reform package, and at least raising revenue as that bill proposes. See the full letter at posted on the Bulletin Board.

### What's coming up?

Speaking of HB 174, we are asking you to **keep the pressure on House members to pass HB 174**. This is the tax reform bill that will protect low/moderate income workers and provide a needed revenue stream to pay for state services as well as begin to pay down the accumulated state debt. Make calls to your representatives before the Legislature's dismissal. The League of Women Voters will be one of the organizations making calls, sending faxes, and emails on Monday, May 3rd, our virtual lobby day.

## League OK with District 200 budget

The League of Women Voters believes the primary purpose of schooling is the transmission of knowledge and culture through which children learn in areas necessary to their continuing development. The Wheaton Warrenville Unit District 200 board budget process should give priority in the allocation of resources to fulfilling the primary purpose of schooling, that of educational excellence for all children.

The League supports the following instructional mandates: language arts, mathematics, science, social studies/history, foreign language, art and music, vocational education, special education, gifted education, early childhood education and health education. The League supports the schools and educational excellence for all children. We realize there is a need for balancing the budget and that cuts have to be made in order to achieve a fiscally responsible budget for 2010-2011.

The League encourages the board to give priority in the allocation of resources to fulfilling the primary purpose of schooling. The cuts discussed by the board at the March 23 meeting on the 2010-11 budget seem fair, and the process has been transparent and open.

The school board should continue to look to save as many full time employees as possible to ensure the continued excellence of the education given to our children. The state of Illinois currently provides 15 percent of District 200's budget and is significantly behind in payments for this school year.

The state should resume funding public schools (mandated by Article 10 of the state constitution) and guarantee adequate levels of financial support. The league supports HB 0174, a comprehensive reform package, and raising at least revenue as that bill proposes. Taxpayers should contact elected officials and urge them to push their leadership to consider revenues adequate to support the budget.

## The League of Women Voters Through the Decades!

### The 1950s:

#### Organization:

Delegates to the 1954 convention voted to group League program into **Current Agenda** ("CAs") government issues chosen for sustained attention and concerted action, and **Continuing Responsibilities** ("CRs") positions on governmental issues to which the League had given sustained attention and on which it could continue to act. In 1951, "The National Voter" magazine was first published and in 1957 the League of Women Voters Education was established. (For more detail, see the section titled League of Women Voters Education Fund and Overseas Education Fund.)

#### Issues:

The witch hunt period of the early fifties inspired the League to undertake a two-year community education program focusing on the individual liberties guaranteed by the Constitution. Next came an evaluation of the federal loyalty/security programs and ultimately a League position that strongly emphasized the protection of individual rights. In 1955 League President Percy Maxim Lee testified before Congress against Senator Joseph McCarthy's abuse of congressional investigative powers. *"I believe tolerance and respect for the opinions of others is being jeopardized by men and women whose instincts are worthily patriotic, but whose minds are apparently unwilling to accept the necessity for dissent within a democracy."*

Dating back to a 1920s study of the Tennessee Valley Authority, the League's concern about the depletion and conservation of natural resources was rekindled in the mid-1950s with a study of water resources.

### The 1960s:

#### Organization:

The 1966 convention redefined program as "those governmental issues chosen for concerted study and action." This change made it possible to have program without the "CA" and "CR" categories, and at the convention in 1968 the program was adopted without categorizing issues. Membership reached a high point in 1969, with almost 157,000 members.

#### Issues:

In response to the growing civil rights crisis of the 1960s the League directed its energies to equality of opportunity and built a solid foundation of support for equal access to education, employment and housing. The League also added apportionment to its national program and supported presidential suffrage for the residents of Washington, DC. In 1969, the League was one of the first organizations calling for the United States to normalize relations with China. The League also hosted an exchange with women from the USSR and the OEF Institutes for Latin American women were inaugurated.

## Workgroup Synopsis

### **Diversity**     Frank Goetz

These are difficult times to engage a diverse group of people in League activities. Planning discussions with College of DuPage administrators to explore possible collaborative efforts - like co-sponsoring a Café Society program - were suspended when COD reorganization began. We'll go back to the drawing board after the summer break.

### **Education, State Fiscal Policy & School Funding**     Joan Fefferman

Our committee attended all of the numerous board of education meetings, including the public forums for discussion of changes to the proposed budget cuts. These reductions, totaling \$8.6 million, were suggested to the Board of Education by the administration of the District and the Finance Committee.

We wrote a letter to the editor, advocating strongly for our positions on education and good fiscal policy. We stressed the need to continue proven programs for early intervention in the learning of the district's children, and the exploration of new streams of revenue by Illinois. At the 4/13/10 DuPage County Board meeting, the board voted 16-1 to renew its agreement with Navistar to move its corporate headquarters and a build a diesel testing site in Lisle. The details of the vote can be read at this link:

### Additional Information from our COD Forum

Dr. Breuder started off by providing us with some statistics on COD, such as: there are 16,300 full time equivalent students, and they spend ¼ billion dollars a year. They print 3000 W2 forms. 6000 cars can park on campus. They grew 9.5% from fall to fall, in the last year.

They are supposed to get 1/3 of their money from the state of Illinois, but this year it is down to about 4%. Local taxes are capped. Tuition will be \$129 per credit hour, so a full time load is under \$5000/year.

He believes that COD should run like a business, and that they must make choices. They have 5 p's: Price, product, promotion, people, and place. Their product is curriculum. Their promotion must tell the story. Their people get the job done. The facilities had gotten very tired, and now they have been or are being refurbished. The plans and monies for this were 8 years in the making.

He talked about several projects, including the new facility for a Homeland Security Education Center, which will be unique in Illinois and in the nation. It could act as an emergency control center, when complete. *To meet community and student demands for newer programs and to be at the forefront of ever-changing training regulations and increasing requirements for Criminal Justice, the Suburban Law Enforcement Academy (SLEA) and Fire Science/EMS training programs, the College of DuPage will construct a new 60,000 square-foot building to house the above mentioned programs as well as state-of-the-art classroom facilities and training labs. A feature element to this building will be an Immersive Training Lab, which will be utilized by all programs including the C.O.D. Police Department. This unique training lab will be a realistic environmental space with streets and building facades.*

He also talked about the Culinary & Hospitality center. *This new 60,000 square-foot building will be located on the northeast side of campus near the McAninch Arts Center (MAC). It will house new and expanded kitchens, bakeshops and a market for Culinary Arts, a fine dining facility, large meeting rooms, training labs, a wellness room for Hotel and Lodging programs, and a new state-of-the-art multimedia center and amphitheater. This building will invite College of DuPage guests, business and community members to visit or even stay on campus to take advantage of the dining and hotel services offered by the Hospitality and Hotel programs, as well as other College of DuPage programs. He said that our dollars are used well.*

There were many questions about cuts to the Older Adult Institute which were perceived as unfair. Basically he said that there were cuts made in many areas, and that they were balanced.

College of DuPage is the third-largest single-campus community college in the nation and the second-largest institution of higher education in Illinois.

Since opening its doors more than 40 years ago, this [fully accredited](#) institution of higher education has increased its credit offerings to provide more than 90 certificate programs, 59 occupational degrees and 45 transfer pre-baccalaureate programs.

In January 2008, the college received a seven-year reaffirmation of accreditation through the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

## **Wheaton City Council Highlights**

### **Meeting: April 5, 2010 Residents Appointed to Boards and Commissions**

The City Council approved the appointment of Barbara Grabowski to the Library Board to fill the position formerly held by Jim Termond; the reappointment of Glennette Turner to a three-year term on the Community Media Commission; the reappointment of Al Seagren to a three-year term on the Housing Commission; the reappointment of Scott Anderson to a three-year term on the Liquor Control Commission; the reappointment of Robert Hesterman to a two-year term on the Police Pension Fund Board; and the reappointment of Teri Ash, Sarah Meisels, and Joy Wilcox to three-year terms on the Sister City Commission.

### **Public Input Sought Regarding Railroad Crossing Closure**

At its Feb. 22 Planning Session, the City Council reviewed plans from Union Pacific to improve the flow of train traffic through the western suburbs. The plan would require the closure of the railroad crossing at Chase Street to construct a place for trains to cross over from one track to another. The project also involves building a pedestrian underpass at this location. This project will be at no cost to the City. The City Council will be seeking comments from residents at the April 19 regular City Council meeting regarding the plan and will consider adopting a resolution in support of the closure. The meeting will be at 7 p.m. April 19 in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 303 W. Wesley St.

### **Bid Awarded for Road Program**

The City Council awarded a bid for the 2010 Road, Sewer and Water Rehabilitation Program to R.W. Dunteman Company of Addison for \$2,934,522.02. The program will improve approximately 5 to 5 ½ miles of roadway, which is less than the typical 8 to 8 ½ miles of roads. To fund a greater portion of the program, the City Council would need to approve the transfer of \$500,000 from the General Fund.

### **Council Passes Resolution Opposing State's Proposed Reduction of Funding Distribution**

The City Council passed a resolution stating the City's opposition to the Governor's proposal to reduce the amount of revenue received by municipalities for the State

Income Tax. Under the Governor's proposal, the City would lose \$1.28 million in revenue.

### ***Meeting: April 19, 2010***

#### **DuPage River Sweep Day is May 15**



In recognition of the annual county-wide stream cleanup event on May 15, Mayor Gresk presented a proclamation to Environmental Improvement Commission member Tom Grimston. The Environmental Improvement Commission encourages residents to participate in River Sweep 2010 on May 15, which involves picking up debris in and along waterways.

#### **Council Adopts Resolution Regarding Railroad Crossing Closure**

The City Council voted 4-2 in favor of adopting a resolution supporting closure of the Chase Street railroad grade crossing. As part of its overall safety improvement plans, Union Pacific would like to close the crossing in order to construct a crossover point for trains. The crossover would improve the flow of train traffic in the western suburbs. Union Pacific's plan also includes building a pedestrian underpass at Chase Street.
